








Boys Will Be Boys 2021

Whadjuk Noongar Boodja. Rooftop Cinema, Perth CBD. Sunrise, International Women's Day, the footy pose.






To No End 2021

Whadjuk Noongar Boodja Waneroo Riding Centre. Horses do not stand still.








The Pool 2020



Whadjuk Noongar Boodja Perth Girls School. Standing in rain and hail.



Lights Will Guide You Home 2021


Whadjuk Noongar Boodja. The Lighthouse, Hillarys Boat Harbour. Sea salt spray and circling boats.

Whadjuk Noongar Boodja. Walyunga National Park. Sunset and some perfect timing.



Lauren's very first group Nood photoshoot was at River Road Studios in 2018 exploring the Me Too movement and body image, Lauren wanted to look at the relationship between the depiction of female bodies in Western Art and how that has ultimately influenced a very long standing societal perception of objectifying women through the male gaze. Lead by curiosity, Lauren wondered what the "female gaze" would look like when capturing the female nude, and this particular image demonstrated the pure joy, liberation and freedom that they all felt being together without judgement or sexualisation. The overwhelmingly positive response received by the public for this shoot, led Lauren to do another - this time daring to venture outside - and shoot by shoot, grow her skills and courage (and in the process blow up her nervous system!) to bring beautiful artwork that evokes conversations for change.

About the Artist

Lauren Crooke

Perth nude photography artist, entrepreneur, and owner and director Perth's leading boudoir photography studio, Crooked Images, Lauren Crooke, is widely-renowned for her breathtaking and thought-provoking mass group nude photoshoots that create her celebrated fine-artwork prints (Nudescapes) captured across Australia and showcase her trademark medium; the nude form of women and non-binary people with radical, Western Art-inspired creative composition that carries a powerful message.

Crooke's photography empowers viewers and participants alike, showing women and non-binary bodies how they deserve to be seen, as works of art through the female lens. Her art works incite conversation while raising awareness about gendered sexual violence, oppression, and inequality, promoting body diversity representation and changing perspectives from the patriarchal male gaze.

Since 2017 she has her unique fine-art photography has grabbed the attention of Australian media with two successful exhibitions and a documentary Tour De Nood (currently in production). Lauren Crooke continues to grow a community of likeminded people across Australia who are empowered and connected through her art and cause with more creative projects in the pipeline.

Combining art with activism, she has become a figurehead for women in the industry and uses her photography as her vessel to promote positive change.
